Now entering its 17th year, the story of the Whistler Writers Festival is well known. Started in my living room with one guest author and 20 participants, the Festival has grown to involve some 60 guest authors, and close to 2000 participants. It's been a long journey of hard work, commitment and focus to produce a program that appeals to as broad and inclusive an audience as possible. In your feedback, you've told us we've hit the right mix and tone. I appreciate all your kind words and suggestions.

But we couldn't have done it without our volunteers, our community leaders, and other influencers, and most importantly, you, our audience, who have come through time and time again. I think of these words, often, "I'm in your corner," uttered more than once in evaluations, emails and in person. Thanks for being there for us. This festival and the writers we have been so fortunate to host could not do what they do without you. That's why the theme of this year's festival is: No one succeeds alone.

Thursday, October 11th will feature: An Evening of Stories and Songs with award-winning author, broadcaster and raconteur extraordinaire Grant Lawrence and an all-star cast, including Dave Bidini, the renowned Toronto musician, author, and founding member of the Rheostatics, Giller Prize-winning author Esi Edugyan, celebrated poet, author and spoken word artist and singer Janet Marie Rogers, and counter-culture cowboy, Dustin Bentall.

On Friday night our Cooks with Books: Passionate Locavore Edition will feature something a little different. Local author, Jane Reid has travelled the province and will share her discoveries of local harvests from her new book. At the same event, we will proudly feature other local owners, entrepreneurs and wonderful cooks including Nicolette Richer, owner of the Green Moustache and Pemberton recipe-blogger Nidhi Raina. There will be samples of appetizers to try and you'll be able to meet these authors and hea them discuss their featured recipes. Following this food lovers event, is The Literary Cabaret. Hosted by local scribe and musician Stephen Vogler, the night combines readings from some of Canada's best-loved authors, accompanied by live music. This year's cabaret features: Sharon Bala, Billy-Ray Belcourt, Kevin Chong, Lorna Crozier, Bill Gaston, Wayne Grady, Joel Thomas Hynes, Patrick Lane, Darrel J. McLeod, Merilyn Simonds, and Carolyn Marie Souaid. The winners of the Whistler Independent Book Awards will be announced at the Literary Cabaret.

Our popular Saturday reading events are back, each featuring authors of different genres: Poetry, Non-Fiction and Fiction. In addition, our **Literary Salon** for book clubs will feature **Eden Robinson**. We encourage you to read Eden's new novel, *Trickster Drift*, because Eden will be onstage at the salon, which will be moderated by the former Vancouver Writers Festival Artistic Director, **Hal Wake**.

Our Saturday Crime Writers Lunch session, moderated by our very own Feet Banks, will host authors Charles Demers, Ian Hamilton, Eve Lazarus, and Sam Wiebe.

On Saturday night, a special main stage event will see Canada Readshost Ali Hassanin conversation with two-time Booker prize-winning author Peter Carey. Ali will join us again on Sunday, October 14th to host our Sunday brunch and discussion with award-winning authors Rawi Hage, Darrel J. McLeod, Lisa Moore, Elizabeth Renzetti, and Kim Thúy. For the early risers, Grant Lawrence will host a walk and reading with Dave Bidini, Charles Demers, Wayne Grady and Merilyn Simondsin A Walk to Lost Lake and Back.

Thursday afternoon workshops will focus on alternatives to traditional publishing while Friday will feature a full day of publishing sessions. Join us for a discussion with publishers about the industry's challenges. The afternoon will offer an opportunity to sit down one-on-one with a publisher to hone your pitching skills. Seven publishers will participate in this event and together they represent all genres.



WRITER IN RESIDENCE PROGRAM **WITH CLAUDIA CASPER**

CLAUDIA CASPER will take up residence in Whistler this fall as the community's official Writer in Residence. Claudia will work with writers on their own projects, starting in mid-September with a potluck get-together and introductory meeting. Residency participants will receive three oneon-one sessions with Claudia to develop their manuscripts, and will attend weekly group lectures on various aspects of the writing craft. The residency forms the manuscript-intensive component of the Whistler Writers Festival. This program is made available through the support of the Resort Municipality of Whistler Community Enrichment Program and the Whistler Writing Society. AUTHORS IN THE SCHOOLS PROGRAM

Schools from Squamish, Whistler, Pemberton, and Mount Currie are given class sets of books from our featured authors who have been selected from a pool of award-winning local, indigenous and Canadian writers. The authors then give presentations and have discussions with the students, to inspire them to write, and tell their own stories. Genres have encompassed fiction, non-fiction, short stories, poetry, picture books and graphic novels. WHISTLER INDEPENDENT BOOK AWARDS

Recognizing excellence in independent publishing

The Whistler Independent Book Awards (WIBAs) are open to Canadian authors who have self-published a book or books in the last five years. Authors from across Canada submitted titles, making the awards a genuinely national affair.

Jointly produced by the Whistler Writing Society, Vivalogue and the Vancouver chapter of the Canadian Authors Association, the Whistler Independent Book Awards signal the evolution of self-publishing. While the industry has grown dramatically in the last decades, there had been no rigorous, independently juried Canadian awards recognizing exceptional quality in these titles. Now in their third year, the WIBAs have become a respected hallmark of excellence.

Judges

Nominees Selecting the shortlist from all the submissions received was the responsibility of Vivalogue Publishing. Each author not shortlisted received a detailed assessment of their work, ensuring that all writers benefited from participating in the competition.

Finalists Nominees were judged by members of the Metro-Vancouver branch of the Canadian Authors Association. The CAA's detailed scoring rubric, combined with the scores from the nominating judge, determined the finalists in each category.

Winners Two distinguished judges for each category made the final selection of the winners, to be announced at the Literary Cabaret on October 12.

Fiction

GAIL ANDERSON-DARGATZ's novels have been published worldwide in English and in many other languages. Her international bestsellers *The Cure for Death by Lightning* and *A Recipe for Bees* were both finalists for the Giller Prize. Her latest novel, *The Spawning Grounds*, was nominated for the OLA Evergreen Award, the Sunburst Award and the Canadian Authors Award for Fiction.

DARCIE FRIESEN HOSSACK is a graduate of the Humber School for Writers and, for eleven years, wrote food memoirs for various western Canadian newspapers. Her short story collection, Mennonites Don't Dance, was a runner-up for the 2011 Danuta Gleed Award, shortlisted for the 2011 Commonwealth Writers Prize, and the 2012 OLA Forest of Reading Evergreen Award for Adult Fiction.

Non-Fiction

JJ LEE is a well-known author, journalist and broadcaster. His debut book, The Measure of a Man: The Story of a Father, a Son, and a Suit, was a finalist for the Governor General's Literary Award, the Charles Taylor Prize, the Hubert Evans Prize and the Hilary Weston Writer's Trust Prize. It was also longlisted for the 2018 Canada Reads competition.

SUE OAKEY BAKER is a teacher, guide, painter and writer who holds degrees in French Literature and Language Education. Her memoir, *Finding Jim*, was published in 2013 by Rocky Mountain Books.

T.G. BROWN (Fiction)


